The following Norway and Alsen articles were submitted by Tom Thaden, a member of the Clay County Historical Society....

Dakota Republican – July 12, 1917

The Fourth of July celebration in Norway Twp. was a success. Rain stopped the doings in the forenoon, but the sky cleared up and afternoon was just right for a celebration. Everyone had dinner, and then things started. The program was opened with music by the band. The program was cut short on account of being late in starting, and Hon. Carl Gunderson who was to have been the speaker of the day did not come out on account of the rain in the afternoon. The sports started at 2:30, and the results were as follows:

Girls' Race, 9 to 12 yrs. - Alice Brunick, 1st; Hilma Hanson, 2nd

Girls' Race, 12 to 15 yrs. - Elsie Mount, 1st; Minona Bottolfson, 2nd

Boys' Race, 9 to 12 yrs. - Henry Millick, 1st; Charles Mount, 2nd

Boys' Race, 12 to 15 yrs. - David Powell, 1st; Ross Tomason, 2nd

Boys' Race, over 15 - Frank Lund, 1st; George Washburn, 2nd

Free-for-all Foot Race - L.H. Ahrendt, 1st; Martin Jorgenson, 2nd

Three-legged Race - Eli Hanson and Nels Brunick, 1st; L.H. Ahrendt and

Hans Jasperson, 2nd

Fat Man's Race - Walter Peterson, 1st; Frank Orr, 2nd

Horse Race - Vernon Brown, 1st; Virgil Brown, 2nd

Ford Race - Thomas Dains, 1st; Nels Nelson, 2nd

The ball game was between the married and single men, and was won by the former by a score of 9 to 13. The battery for the married men were Bob and Frank Orr, and for the single men Ben Brunick and Nels Nelson.

The band boys wish to thank all who joined the celebration, and all who helped in making the day a success.

Labor Day at Alsen

Big Crowd in Attendance at the Annual Picnic in Spite of the Threatening Weather Dakota Republican – September 10, 1914

Monday morning boded no good for the annual M.W.A. Labor Day picnic at Alsen, but the rain clouds blew away after the copious downpour and the sun came out to dispel the gloom. The result was that there was a big crowd present at the annual affair, and it was a success in spite of the fact that the crowd was not as large as it undoubtedly would have been had it not been for the early morning rain and the following threatening skies.

The program of the day was well carried out. A good crowd listened to Antoinette Funk of Chicago, the speaker of the day. The Democrats held a big meeting and launched their campaign for the fall. The baseball game between Alton and Hurley resulted in favor of the former by a score of 7 to 0. The bowery dance was well patronized, both in the afternoon and evening, and all enjoyed the music furnished by the Collins Orchestra. There was plenty of enter-tainment of all kinds, and what time was not spent in taking in the different shows was left free for the button-holeing by the politicians that were on the grounds. Taking it all in all, it was about as successful as any of the picnics held every year in the big grove at Alsen. The Alsen Woodsmen certainly did everything in their power to make it an interesting occasion for those who attended, and their efforts were appreciated by all.

Vermillion was well represented, but only about a quarter of those went who would have gone had the weather been good. The city band went up to help advertise the Clay County Fair, and the fair managers were on hand with a goodly amount of advertising matter.
