Excerpts taken from the Sioux City Journal June 19, 1973....

Burbank to Mark 100th Year

The Town of Burbank located in Southeastern South Dakota will commemorate the 100th anniversary of its founding at a one-day centennial celebration.

The celebration will get under way at 8 a.m. with open air church services at the school. The centennial parade will step off at 10 a.m., a potluck reunion dinner is scheduled at noon, and at 1:30 in the afternoon there will be a ballgame between the Burbank Bloomer Girls and the Wakonda Girls. There will also be other games for children and adults.

Horse races are scheduled to begin at 3 p.m. and the barbecue will begin at 6:30 p.m. A talent show at 7 o'clock and a pavement dance at 8:30 o'clock will conclude the day's activities.

A centennial museum will be open during the day in the Old Burbank Bank Building which also housed the U.S. Post Office at Burbank from 1939 until July 31, 1972.

Centennial cochairmen are Francis Fullenkamp, Mrs. John Bell, Wayne Hawley, Bill Anderson and Agnes Malloy.

The Burbank town site was surveyed and platted on June 8, 1873, by Cornelius Andrews, Nelson W. Cusick and Jonas Meckling. The town was platted along the right-of-way of the Dakota Southern Railroad and was named in honor of John A. Burbank, governor of the Dakota Territory from 1869 to 1874.

The Burbank Post Office was opened June 23, 2873, and the first postmaster was Roswell A. Hotchkiss. The town today boasts only a post office, a restaurant-nightclub and several residences. (Before 1910 there was a school building that formed the nucleus of "Whimp's, a popular Burbank restaurant. Photo and article was published in Sioux City Journal June 19, 1973.)

In 1910 there was a bank, two lumberyards, two general stores and three elevators. At that time, the town also had a blacksmith shop, two restaurants, a boarding house, a barber shop, a butcher shop a hardware store and a couple of saloons. During the early part of the century, the town also boasted a thriving stockyards facility. Miss Malloy, Burbank postmaster from 1921 until 1963 recalled that farmers would drive their stock to Burbank and keep them in separate herds around the town until they could drive the cattle to the pens for loading on railcars. In those days, all of the livestock was shipped to Chicago. The Stockyards were destroyed by fire sometime before November 1919.


The site of the town of Burbank had a history before the new town was platted. A man by the name of Alec C. Young settled there in 1855, and for several years the area was known as Alec C's Point. It was a favorite camping ground for freighters and teamsters on military expeditions.

In 1911, the ladies of the community decided to organize a club under the name of the Burbank Thimble Club.

The members met every two weeks for many years and club activities included quilting bees, showers, canning, oyster suppers for couples, sewing for friends and neighbors, ice cream socials and dances in the Modern Woodmen Hall.

The first rural electric cooperative in South Dakota was formally organized at a meeting of 17 men in the general store operated by E.J. Manning at Burbank. Known as the Fairview Rural Electric System, first plans for the cooperative later were changed to include more farmers to make the Rural Electrification Association Loan "feasible"

The expanded cooperative was named Clay-Union Electric Corp., the first in the state to get a loan from the R.E.A. The charter for the first co-op was dated Nov. 29, 1935. After nearly two years of hard work, 67 miles of line were constructed and electricity began to flow through lines on Oct. 3, 1937.

Burbank School No. 10 is on the National Register of Historical Places.

For many years the school had 10 grades, but this was reduced to eight grades in the fall of 1952.

The school is still being used today for events, barbeques and the Easter Egg Hunt.
